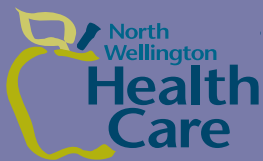

Mental Health & Addiction Services now “Here 24/7”

This past year North Wellington Health Care (NWHC), Groves Memorial Hospital, Guelph General Hospital and Homewood Health Centre partnered with the Canadian Mental Health Association to provide patients with improved mental health and addiction services. Based in our hospitals Emergency Departments, the Here 24/7 - crisis services program augments our Homewood On-site Crisis workers, after hours and on weekends. This reduces hospital wait times by improving the flow of patients accessing acute mental health beds at Homewood.



Baby-Friendly Designation

The Baby-Friendly Initiative (BFI) is a global endeavor focused on the protection, promotion and support of breastfeeding both in hospital and with external care providers. This past year NWHC has continued to pursue completion of the official Baby-Friendly designation process. This work reflects North Wellington’s desire to provide mothers and infants with the best of care. If successful, NWHC will be the fifth hospital in Canada to achieve BFI designation. Thanks to Nancy Cleary, Patient Care Manager, Palmerston and District Hospital for leading this important initiative.



Music in Mind

The human brain is hard-wired to connect music with long-term memory. Listening to music can tap deep emotional recall, calm chaotic brain activity and stimulate both speech and memory for those experiencing cognitive impairment. This spring, HELP student, Chelsea Postma along with dedicated Volunteer Heather Halls and her husband Brad worked to create *Music in Mind* for the Hospital Elder Life Program (H.E.L.P) at Groves. *Music in Mind* utilizes portable listening devices to provide patients access to their favorite music and audiobooks. The program can increase patient satisfaction, motivation and mood while decreasing pain.



New surgical equipment allows care, close to home

Thanks to the support of the Hospital Foundation, Louise Marshall Hospital (LMH) was able to purchase new surgical equipment used by our Obstetrician-Gynecologist. Thermalablation is a safe, effective and minimally invasive surgical equipment used to replace the need for hysterectomies (a surgical operation to remove all or parts of the uterus). With the thermalablation procedure, patients are only in the hospital for the day vs. three days with a hysterectomy procedure. Patients no longer need to travel to Guelph for this procedure, they are able to receive quality care, close to home.

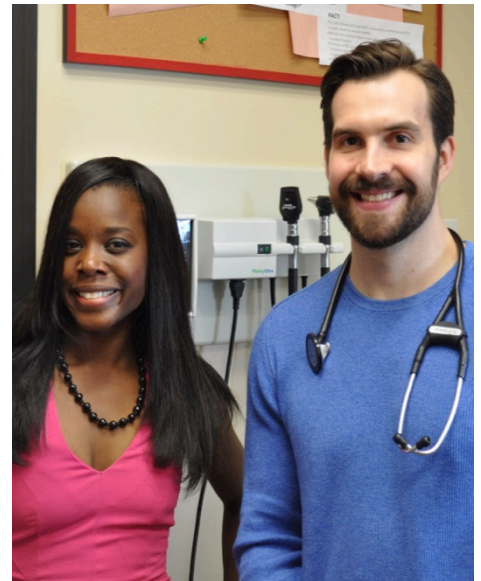
Dr. Lapper (left) and Dr. John Reaume (right)

Capital updates: North Wellington Health Care

Plans continue for the redevelopment of the Louise Marshall Hospital (LMH) ambulatory care and emergency department. A major planning milestone was reached in December 2016 with LMH receiving approval, from the Ministry of Health and Long-term Care (MOHLTC), to move ahead with Stage 3 planning.

Stage 3 Design Development planning includes details for all rooms and equipment placement in the overall space, and will require a construction phasing plan and cost estimate. The design work will take into consideration best clinical practices, accessibility, infection prevention/control, and departmental flow.

After Stage 3 planning is complete, work will begin on Stage 4 tender documents which will be submitted to the MOHLTC by the end of the 2017/18 fiscal year. The expansion is expected to be completed by the end of 2019.

As plans continue for the LMH expansion, building upgrades continue at both of our hospital sites.

Palmerston and District Hospital (PDH) installed a new high-efficiency, commercial boiler system. The new boiler comes with Smart Touch operating controls making it easy to use, control and maintain. Thanks to the PDH Foundation for funding the new boilers.

Plans are also underway for new Medical Education space at LMH and PDH. The ability to learn in a hospital setting is fundamental to the education of our future physicians and nurses. NWHC provides teaching, year-round, to medical trainees. The new Medical Education space will include videoconferencing as well as a multi-purpose conference/study room.

A New: Groves Hospital

It has been a busy year planning for the new Groves Hospital. In June 2016, Infrastructure Ontario (IO) and Groves Memorial Community Hospital (GMCH) released a request for proposals (RFP) to design, build and finance a new Groves Hospital. Three pre-qualified teams, each of which includes a developer/builder, designer and a financial advisor, were invited to submit proposals.

After extensive evaluations, in May 2017, IO and GMCH selected EllisDon Infrastructure Healthcare to design, build and finance the new Groves Hospital. IO and GMCH will finalize contract details with EllisDon Infrastructure Healthcare by mid-June 2017 and ground breaking is expected mid-July 2017.

The new hospital will be built in Centre Wellington, between Elora and Fergus. Expected to be completed in late 2019, the new GMCH project will include:

- a replacement hospital built on a greenfield site, with more space for emergency, ambulatory, diagnostic and inpatient services to accommodate a growing community
- 37 of the 45 beds will be in private single patient rooms with a dedicated washroom and shower and large windows - the remaining eight beds will be in two-bed rooms each with a private washroom
- modernized infection control measures, including additional isolation facilities, to enhance the hospital's ability to respond to a pandemic or disease outbreak
- an onsite helipad to allow for faster access to patient transfers by air ambulance
- large windowed areas that allow natural light to penetrate deep into the building and ultimately connect the interior with the outside
- Simplified way-finding, making it easy for visitors and patients to navigate to their desired destinations. Hospital services that are used most frequently by outpatients are positioned closest to the main entrance to ensure easy access.

GHVA *New To You:* Supporting Groves Hospital

In addition to the activities in the Hospital the GHVA runs the New to You Shop located on Highway 6 on the north end of Fergus. The shop sells gently used articles donated by the surrounding communities. Volunteers perform tasks such as receiving donations at the shop, sorting, preparing for sale such items as linens, clothing, kitchen items, books, children's clothes and many more. All of this effort makes the New to You Shop one of the largest retailers in Fergus and area. All of the net proceeds from the Gift Shop and New to You Shop go to the hospital. Since 1933, the GHVA has donated over \$3 million dollars to the Hospital. This has all been made possible by the efforts of many volunteers over the past 80+ years.

All of the efforts of the Gift Shop and the New to You Shop continue to make a substantial contribution to GMCH. In keeping with this, the Groves Hospital Volunteers Association was pleased to announce on May 16, 2016 that it is pledging a further \$1 million to the new Groves Hospital Campaign. This amount will be paid over the next ten years.

Louise Marshall Hospital Foundation: Supporting quality care, close to home

Community support is what helps to make Louise Marshall Hospital a high quality, rural health care facility. With the tremendous support from our community, the Louise Marshall Hospital Foundation (LMHF) was able to help purchase equipment that is vital to our hospital.

- Through the 15th CKNX Health Care Heroes Radiothon, supporters exceeded our goal of \$75,000 to fund new laparoscopic equipment for use in the operating room
- In June 2016, the annual Fire Chief's Gala provided LMHF with \$22,000 and fully funded the purchase of a new BIPAP Ventilator Unit (a machine that delivers air through a mask, to a patient's airways)
- Germania Mutual Insurance hosted a tent at the International Plowing Match and raised \$9,000 for Meditech (a Pharmacy computer software)
- The Little Black Dress Affair raised \$7,500 towards the purchase of a Nitronox Blender to be used in Obstetrics (for pain relief)
- In October, Walk for Cancer Care committee and participants helped cancer patients and funded \$6,469 for a new stretcher for Oncology

Funds received through a combination of fundraisers, memorial and estate gifts allowed the Foundation to support the LMH redevelopment of the Emergency room and Ambulatory Care areas.

The LMHF would like to thank all of the volunteers, private donors and individuals who sponsor third party events. All of your donations allow our hospital to provide quality care, close to home.

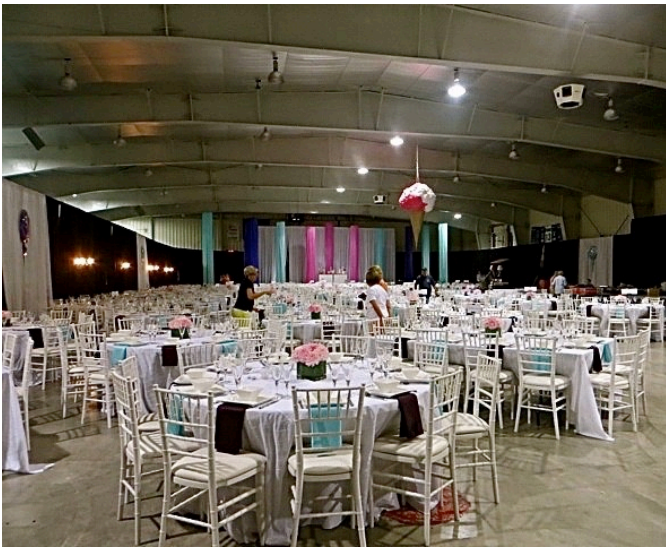

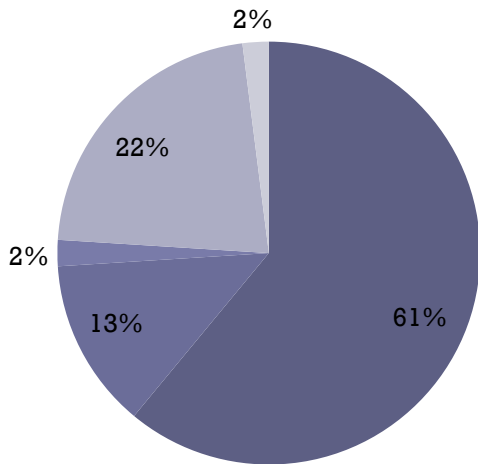
